APRIL 29 QUARTERLY LUNCHEON WITH SUPERVISOR JAMES GORE

Supervisor James Gore spoke at the April 29 quarterly luncheon, sponsored by the Mark West Area Chamber of Commerce.

He said that we need to have a citizens' committee to represent this large community. Much of what is referred to as the Mark West Area is outside the Santa Rosa city limits and in those areas, the county provides all municipal services. If they were in the city, a planning and review committee would be set up for each issue. This community has no representation, in spite of a large population.

He is in support of and encourages the Mark West Citizens Advisory Council (MWCAC). They are within a month of drafting the "Blue Book", which is basically a book of objectives.

This committee would be made up of representatives from different aspects of the community and would be able to work closely with him and his planning commissioners. The council would be responsible for planning, review and other applications. The community would have a voice and be informed.

An example of how the Citizens Council can work together with the Planning Committee would be the allocation of the franchise fees, which are paid to Cal American Water, through water bills. These fees are passed on to the county and are to be used for this area.

Other examples were:

The Ortiz Family Plaza... The MWCAC would include the community in the planning by way of public meetings and planning committees.

The installation of a stop light on Old Redwood Hwy, in front of the Larkfield Shopping Center... A citizens committee could push it through if the residents want it.

The weed patch that county roads employees cleaned up on Lavell Rd... Local citizens could be involved in what happens with that spot.

Supervisor Gore also mentioned that he wants to give a sponsorship of about \$1,000 to our Mark West Area Business Expo this year. He can get this money from the TOT funds (transient occupancy tax), which is basically a hotel bed tax. He wants to be involved in the Business Expo.

He expressed his appreciation for all the work done by the students of the Sonoma State Environmental Studies and Planning Workshop on the new Larkfield-Wikiup Policy Report. See the article on page 6 of this newsletter.

He said he is in support of a measure on the June ballot for a 1/4 percent tax

increase to go to the ongoing repair of roads that have been neglected for way too long. We have 1,394.6 miles of road in this county, outside of the city, and we can't make a dent in the repair backlog as things are now. This would be a general tax, with annual audits and it sunsets in five years. Critics of the measure are concerned that it will go to the general fund. Supervisor Gore assured us it would go to roads and transportation. The Board of Supervisors is putting together a 5-year contract to allocate that money.

One guest asked why there was confusion over actual water levels in Lake Mendocino and Lake Sonoma. Supervisor Gore said that the numbers don't accurately represent what is happening. Much of Lake Mendocino is allocated as flood control water in the winter. In the summer, the same water is reclassified as water supply. There are multiple regulatory agencies involved, often with conflicting and changing priorities. This situation is far too complex to discuss in this article. The main point Gore made was that the laws are changing because of the drought and it will take years to get it all straightened out.

Supervisor Gore mentioned that there is much talk of a community center in Larkfield but no location has been identified. In the meantime, the garden at Maddox Park is going forward. You can see evidence of that by walking along the edge of it, in the park on Lavell Rd.

Regarding pensions, Supervisor Gore is an advocate for the creation of a committee to review the numbers surrounding the pension issue. At this point, they are disputed. Who do you trust? As with any issue, we have to have facts that are verifiable and trustworthy in order to move ahead.

The SMART Train is on board to have passenger service from Airport Blvd. to downtown San Rafael in the latter part of 2016. The maintenance station will be on Airport Blvd, at Aviation Blvd.

Some folks were asking about the train going further north to Healdsburg and Cloverdale. It will take a while to reach those points, due to the millions of dollars it will take to accomplish it. It's a complicated matter of money and making the parts fit. As you move north, there are overlapping regulations that stop progress.

To get to Windsor, it will cost \$26 million. Each stop north of there will also cost several millions. Shuttles from Healdsburg, Windsor, and Cloverdale will be set up in the meantime.

The Supervisor concluded with the observation that we need to not just yell about what needs doing, but jump in there and work together to get things done. There are many innovative and hard-working groups working on various issues. If they don't connect with each other, little planning and progress gets done. One of his goals as Supervisor is to help connect these dots.

A question was raised about security around and aboard the SMART train. The Supervisor said that it is being worked on and he doesn't know the answer yet. He knows Senator McGuire is working on it.

Another question was why there is no progress regarding GMO restrictions in this county. He said that the public vote didn't eliminate them, countywide. Supervisors try not to go against public opinion. A vote by the people would be required to eliminate GMOs.

POLICY REPORT FOR LARKFIELD-WIKIUP: BY SSU ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES & PLANNING STUDENTS

On Thursday, April 30, students from the Environmental Studies and Planning Workshop class at Sonoma State University presented their Policy Report for the community of Larkfield-Wikiup. The Policy Report is a follow-up to the Existing Conditions Report presented in February. This article gives you just a taste of the topics covered. You can download the entire Policy Report here:

The report, and their presentation, focused on the following areas.

Community Character and Urban Design: Maintaining and enhancing our identity

There are distinct communities within Larkfield. We should redefine the community as one place to call home. Highlight and preserve the local history; develop maps and websites, using social media and tools such as QR codes. Use local or historical names on businesses, post welcome signs, use multiple techniques to preserve the views, showcase public art and more.

Economic Vitality: Providing shopping choices and employment

The goal is to have an economy based on convenience and community pride. They suggest promoting GO LOCAL rewards cards, shadow days for students at businesses, ads for local healthy food, events sponsored by local business owners, and a development review process. They also suggest getting the community focused on green sustainable business.

Housing: Discover how we live, and plan accordingly.

We should aim for a community that reflects environmental and social equity and promotes fair housing programs that complement the existing neighborhoods.

Land Use: Discover and plan so we balance our future needs.

They suggest creating more stable use of the land, and making it more "walkable," or friendly to pedestrian traffic. We should also have "Thirduse spaces" which are convenient, favorite regular places to go, aside from work and home. Examples are community centers, coffee shops, and parks. This will encourage people to stay in the area and not spend their recreation time and money elsewhere. It will also reduce traffic, increase property values and create space for happiness and quality of life.

Mobility: Making accommodations for how we travel

We need an efficient transportation and road system to mimimize peak hour congestion. This must be balanced with current and future land uses and coordinate with existing systems to minimize throughtraffic in residential areas. They recommend following the Complete Streets principle (which promotes safety for all users) on key routes such as Old Redwood Highway, Shiloh Road and Mark West Springs Road, while paying attention to the Disabilities Act and using roundabouts in appropriate places. And they recommend integration with the SMART Train.

Public Facilities & Services: Supporting community safety & needs

They suggest creating a Citizens Committee that would include an outdoor activities committee and a community events committee. Considerations are encouraging sustainable landscaping, water waste management, dog parks, a community center, and the third-Use spaces previously described.

Environmental Systems and Hazards: Interacting with our environment

This is about comfort, education and awareness. They suggest workshops, meetings, pamphlets, action plans, and building assessments to find ways to mitigate noise pollution. They urge preservation of Mark West Creek via education and incentives, workshops, and publicly reported monthly water tests.

Health and Wellness: Promoting healthy activities and lifestyles

Suggestions were to adjust houses so seniors can age in place. We need to ensure access to healthy food, and consider successful techniques from other communities such as community gardens, mobile food facilities and non-profit kitchens. Public spaces for healthy activities such as walking and adaptive/inclusive recreation opportunities are important. Our children need safe routes to school and safe places to wait for the bus. Further, promote crime prevention through environmental design and street lighting.

Next Steps

Is up to the county and the public to decide what is to be done. There are diverse opinions; many people want these changes and many people want everything to remain as it is. It is important that the community and individual citizens communicate with 4th District Supervisor James Gore and attend planning meetings.
