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SMART TRAIN REPORT:

MARK WEST CHAMBER QUARTERLY LUNCHEON, MATT STEVENS, SMART TRAIN OUTREACH PROGRAM

For the past two generations, Sonoma County has been without passenger trains. The passenger trains all stopped due to fires, floods, economics, cars and freeways. There were a few tourist trains operated by Northwestern Pacific here and there, but nothing you could really call passenger service.

But that's about to change. Now SMART (Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit) owns the tracks and the rails are being rebuilt, and trains are being built. Both will have the latest and greatest technology. Everything in the system is state of the art. The rails are built for trains traveling up to 100 mph.

START-

Sumitomo Corporation of America in Illinois is building the trainsets. The plan was to make the trains "sexy" as Matt put it. They are inviting and the ride is very enjoyable. The train cars have leather seats and huge windows. There are racks for 24 bicycles, wheelchairs and/or strollers. They will also have tables, most likely a wine & beer bar, and possibly

Train Facts

Top speed is 79 mph, with an average speed of 40 mph. There will be 30 trains per day, 15 in each direction. They will be coming through every half hour during peak busy periods. They now have six two-car trainsets. The noise level is about 70 decibels 50 feet away from the train. That's pretty quiet for a train. These trains are clean burning, showing a huge reduction in greenhouse gas emissions over less advanced technologies.

even food vendors. Food and beverage availability is under discussion.

The complete system uses Positive Train Control, a set of computerized systems that allow Central Dispatch to stop the train. Dispatch sees all. For instance, if a train is travelling faster than the designated safe speed for a particular area, Dispatch can override the driver and safely bring it to a stop. It takes 800 to 1,000 feet to stop a train traveling at 79 mph. This will prevent many accidents before they happen, which is far better than reacting to them afterward. All incidents will be recorded and dealt with accordingly. There will be a dispatcher at Airport Blvd.

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QUARTERLY LUNCHEON REPORT, CONTNUED FROM PAGE 1

The first phase, which has been very much controlled by the economy, will put trains on the rails from the airport in Santa Rosa to the center of San Rafael. They also now have

half the funds they need to get to Larkspur. They are optimistic for more.

There are three stations in Santa Rosa: Railroad Square, Guerneville Road, and the Sonoma County Airport. Others are in Rohnert Park, Cotati,



Petaluma, Novato and San Rafael.

An employer driven shuttle service is being put in place for all stations.

There will be bike/train synergy paths. These will be recreational paths for all users as well as those going to and from the trains. So far, 42 miles of these paths have been built.

The plan is currently for Airport Boulevard to have its first train of the day start at 5:00 am and San Rafael will send out its last train at 8:30 pm. There are no plans for express trains at this point.

"Clipper Card" payment cards will be available. You will load it, tag it, and go. They will also interface with the bus system. Ticket vending machines will be available.

SMART Train is working to help build rail-safe communities. They have been working with Safety Pals, the fire department safety program, for four years. They work in collaboration with students and teachers in the community. The goal is to get people to think "See track? Think train." Sometimes the trains will be coming through every 15 minutes, so awareness by motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists will be vital.

What's next?

Testing every part of everything. In fact it has already begun. Every part and every system on the rails, on the trains themselves, and at the stations will be tested. In June they will run mock service as though passengers were on the trains.

- There was a great Question & Answer period, which rendered up these facts.
- There is no bus service to the areas served just yet, but they are working on it.
- Ridership is expected to be 6,000 to 6,500 riders or more per day.
- The trip from Airport Boulevard to San Rafael will take about one hour and five minutes.
 - Rails are shared with freight and, yes, they do foresee an increase in freight trains.
- They will be hiring around 100 train operators and maintenance personnel and will be looking for people with experience.
- Security on the train: two employed personnel, who are cross trained in law enforcement practices, will be on the trains and police will be on and around the tracks.
- SMART has a grant to purchase three C cars, to fit in between existing cars when service increases.
- Cloverdale: They don't know when they'll get there. It is heavily dependent upon finances, but is definitely the next location slated for connection. They are talking about an express bus to Airport Boulevard in the meantime.

PRESS DEMOCRAT EDITORIAL: A ROSY OUTLOOK DESPITE IT ALL

In spite of all the worry about drought, homelessness and housing — and a temperamental stock market — the economy is doing just fine here on the North Coast. And the future is looking bright, at least for the next two years.

That was the rosy picture painted by economist Chris Thornberg before a crowd of some 450 people gathered at the Vineyard Creek Hyatt Friday [October 30]. Among the many forecasts that Thornberg, founding partner of Beacon Economics, has delivered over the years, this was one of the most optimistic. "You have a wonderful two years ahead of you," he told those gathered at the Economic Development Board's annual breakfast.

And why not?

The county's jobless rate has dropped to 3.8 percent, the sixth lowest in the state. The cost of living, although high for many who struggle to stay here, is more that 52 percent less than in San Francisco, and tourism, a key driver of the local economy, is soaring. Occupancy rates for the county are upwards of 80 percent. "Time to get some new hotels, folks," Thornberg said.

And as Susan Gorin, chairwoman of the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors, said, the county is in the 95th percentile of counties in the nation in terms of wage growth. Joblessness is down not because people are leaving the labor markets but because they are finding decent jobs.

In addition, the region benefits from positive news on the national front, helped by low energy costs, increased retail and industrial activity and a "modest, solid expansion" of the economy. Thornberg rejected contentions that the nation might be back where it was in 2006. Some credit issues remain, but there's no housing bubble, he said. "It's not even close," he said. "Housing is still a great deal. Go buy."

Yes, America has some concerns about a "frothy" stock market, continued uncertainty over state and local budgets, and concerns about the global economy. "But none of these are a recession-causing event," he said.

There remain some real concerns ranging from wealth inequality — 1 percent of the world's population currently owns 50 percent of the wealth — to college debt, which averages close to \$30,000 per graduate now. But Thornberg dismissed any suggestion that going to college may not be worth the cost anymore. "Getting a college degree is the best investment you will ever make," he said.
